



INVITATION FOR STAKEHOLDER TO SUBMIT WRITTEN COMMENTS ON ESKOM'S GENFLEX TARIFF AND THE INCORPORATION OF THE MAXIMUM EXPORT CAPACITY (MEC) INTO THE NOTIFIED MAXIMUM DEMAND (NMD) RULES.

The National Energy Regulator of South Africa (NERSA) is a regulatory authority established as a juristic person in terms of Section 3 of the National Energy Regulator Act, 2004 (Act No. 40 of 2004). NERSA's mandate is to regulate the electricity, piped-gas and petroleum pipelines industries in terms of the Electricity Regulation Act, 2006 (Act No. 4 of 2006), Gas Act, 2001 (Act No. 48 of 2001) and Petroleum Pipelines Act, 2003 (Act No. 60 of 2003). The governance structure of the Regulator consists of nine members, five of whom are part-time and four are full-time, including the Chief Executive Officer (CEO). The Regulator is supported by a secretariat under the direction of the CEO.

Eskom would like to introduce a new tariff called "GenFlex" for customers consuming and generating electricity at the same point of supply (or metering point) for urban and rural supplies that are connected to Distribution and Transmission networks.

NERSA has published an **Eskom's Genflex tariff and the incorporation of the Maximum Export Capacity (MEC) into the Notified Maximum Demand (NMD) rules** together with the **Timelines for the Approval Process (Annexure 1)** on 19 July 2013 on NERSA's website www.nersa.org.za

Stakeholders are requested to comment in writing on **Eskom's Genflex tariff and the incorporation of the Maximum Export Capacity (MEC) into the Notified Maximum Demand (NMD) rules**.
